and too warm meeting room Saturday morning (the hotel changed that later), the breakfasts were not too well handled by the hotel, anything else?



The exhibit – before the ribbon-cutting ceremony.



News From the Institute of Texan Cultures

The new “Jewish Texans” exhibit (also known as SHALOM Y’ALL) has now been open for over a month, and visitation has been brisk.

However, many of the floor docents (guides) have been somewhat reluctant to take groups into the exhibit because of their very limited knowledge of the subject.

In order to alleviate this reluctance, a training course for floor guides was held each day during the first week of June, during the noon hour.

Laurie Gudzikowsky, the assistant program director for ITC, and driving force behind the project for the past three years, (each) gave an introduction to the history of the exhibit, and then the docents were taken to the floor for talks by Jim

Cosgrove, designer of the exhibit, and Walter Fein, long-time docent, active in the planning and development of the exhibit. Many terms were clarified, strange words and concepts explained, and many, many questions were answered. Hopefully, the total of 55 persons who took the training are now better prepared to present the area to visitors.

The award was given in recognition of his work at the Institute book store, as well as his involvement in the updating and complete reworking of the Jewish exhibit.

Kariel Named Citizen of the Year

Louis Weisman Kariel, Jr. was named Marshall's 1997 Citizen of the Year by the Greater Marshall Chamber of Commerce at their 84th Annual Awards Banquet.

Kariel, who has strong roots in Marshall, was recognized for his many civic efforts.

"Many youngsters and adults know how to swim because of his work as head of the Water Safety Committee of the Harrison County Red Cross," said Tony Williams, Marshall City Manager, and as 1996 recipient of the prestigious award, made this year's presentation. Williams also cited Kariel's activity in Jaycees, the American Legion and its boys' and girls' programs and the Lion's Club.

Last year was a momentous year for Kariel, both personally and professionally. His downtown The Hub Shoe Store marked 100 years as a family-owned business and he turned 70 on his birthday.

Clearly emotional and speechless, Kariel was able to muster an expression of appreciation.

"I can't believe it, but I do appreciate this very much," Kariel said. "Marshall has meant a lot to me and to our family and my dad made a speech one time. "The Lord has been good to us."

Kariel contributed to Marshall's cultural affairs by serving as president of the Marshall Symphony Society for several years. The organization built a strong membership under his leadership. He also began the father/daughter luncheon for girls who were being presented by the Marshall Symphony League.

"To give you a feel for his sense of humor, he called this event the "Symphony Pops," said Williams.

Kariel served as a member of the Planning and Zoning commission for seven years and served as a member of and chairman of the Marshall Public Library Board of

Trustees.

Affectionately known as 'Marshall's First Husband,' Kariel supports the political career of his wife Mayor Audrey Kariel.

Proud of his religious heritage, Kariel has devoted much time and effort to serving on the board of Temple Moses Montefiore Congregation for 13 years, until 1973. He continues to attend religious services in Longview and has served on the temple's board in recent years. Kariel also has worked on behalf of the Marshall Hebrew Benevolent Society which restores the Jewish Cemetery. He headed up the restoration efforts that resulted in an historical marker being placed at the cemetery in 1989," Williams said.

Currently, Kariel is working as a member of Triad, a statewide organization compiled of law enforcement agencies and citizens working together to assist the elderly.

Restoration of a Jewish Cemetery in Gonzales

After years of neglect, barring a few sporadic cleanups, a group from a Spring Branch synagogue, near Houston, is breathing life into a forgotten Jewish cemetery.

In March, the group from Congregation Beth Am uncovered from weeds and debris 15 headstones and monuments of Jewish men, women and children who were buried between 1861 and 1901.

Located just outside Gonzales, about 2-1/2 hours west of Houston, the modest cemetery lies in a field on a 250-acre farm owned by John Beiler, an Amish farmer from Pennsylvania.

It was during a January trip by the congregation's senior citizens to look at historic homes and visit two established Jewish cemeteries in Gonzales when Jack Kronick was inspired to find the whereabouts of the old cemetery. When Kronick returned in February with his wife, they found the cemetery had gone to ruin.

The approximately 50-foot by 100-foot site, which is about a quarter occupied, is the final resting place of some early Jewish settlers according to the dates on the stones and records. The names on the gravestones have their own stories, as Kronick discovered.

When Jeannette Hirsch died in 1873, she was brought to the Gonzales cemetery from Corpus Christi when a son-in-law of Capt. Richard King, the founder of the King Ranch, blocked her burial because she was Jewish, according to the book *Deep in the Heart of Texas*, by Ruthe Winegarten and Cathy Schechter. Her husband, David Hirsch, carried her body 140 miles by covered wagon to her final resting place. The Beth Am group returned in May to restore the broken parts of the monument at the grave site of Jeannette Hirsch.

Congregation Beth Am is requesting donations to put up a new fence, costing \$2,000, to keep animals out. With 50 people sending in \$40 each, this could be easily accomplished. The donation checks will be cashed only when the entire amount is received.

Matchmaking: From the Garden of Eden to Cyberspace

Filmmakers and Society members Cynthia Salzman Mondell and Allen Mondell are beginning production on their documentary film, "Matchmaking: From the Garden of Eden to Cyberspace." And you might be able to help them find everything from *shadchans* to home movies.

The film will explore and essential element of Jewish life – matchmaking – an institution that has been operating since Adam and Eve to preserve our Jewish heritage. From Biblical times and the paid matchmaker of the *shetl* to the singles groups and dating services in Cyberspace, Jewish matchmakers have taken many different shapes and forms.

Through personal stories from the past to the present, they'll show how Jewish singles are finding each other and how the Jewish community is offering them support. The film is not only intended to entertain but also to raise issues and generate discussions that are critical to Jewish survival-identity, assimilation and continuity.

They're looking for *shadchans* or modern day matchmakers, arranged marriages, home movies of how Jewish singles of earlier generations came together, Internet marriages, successful singles programs like Profiles in Dallas, the

names of Yiddish films or American films which featured a matchmaker, music or art which includes themes of matchmaking, and any organizations or institutions which bring single Jews together.

If you don't have any suggestions, maybe you know someone who can help them - a rabbi, a teacher/professor, a well-informed community person. The subject matter of the film is not restricted to Texas.

Ideally, the film will air on television, but they cannot guarantee that at this time. They can guarantee that their production and distribution company Media Projects will distribute the film to organizations and institutions worldwide. Their film "West of Hester Street" was completed in 1983. Since then, it has traveled the world, showing in theaters, airing nationwide on PBS and in Europe, Israel and South Africa.
