Society's Texas Jewish history aimed at seventh graders

Representatives of Houston Jewish religious and day schools will receive copies of a new *Curriculum Guide*, recently published by the Texas Jewish Historical Society, at its Board meeting on October 7, according to Doris Glasser, committee chair.

Copies will be distributed to all religious schools in Texas.


The Guide is written for use at the seventh grade level when all Texas junior high students must study Texas history. Funded by the Foundation of the Jewish Federation of Greater Dallas and two native Dallasites, Dr. Stanley Schneider (Austin) and Martin

Schneider (Atlanta), the Guide is designed to be used as its major text and reference for the TeJHaS's new book, Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews.

The *Guide* was written by Kenneth Midlo, director of education for Houston's Temple Beth Israel and former president of the National Association of Temple Educators.


Camp named site of annual meet

Texas pioneers in business buried at site in Dallas

The Temple Emanu-El Cemetery, established in 1884 by Temple Emanu-El Congregation at Howell at Lemmon Avenue, was the second Jewish cemetery in Dallas. (The first was established by the Hebrew Benevolent Society in 1872, located downtown on Akard St.

It is now called the Pioneer Cemetery beside the Dallas Convention Center.)

The first burials at the Howell location were those of Russian immigrants Aaron L. Levy and Jacob Rosenthal, both born in Russia in 1856 and died on October 7, 1884.

Others interred here are many of Dallas' earliest business, civic religious, political and social leaders like Sanger, Harris, Dreyfuss, Marcus, Kahn, Linz, and Kramer, as well as Rabbis David Lefkowitz and Levi A.

Olan. Also buried here are veterans of both world wars and several survivors of the Nazi Holocaust.

Records of all burials are kept in a log book; some burials have "pauper" written and the congregation absorbed the cost.

The cemetery has approximately 3400 graves, and at an average of 26 burials a year, would have space for another 137 years.




Illustration shows the Ark of the Covenant, Temple Moses Montefiore in Marshall.

State marker honors cemetery in Marshall

An official Texas Historical Marker was dedicated for the Marshall Hebrew Cemetery on May 18 at the Marshall Public Library.

The Cemetery was established in 1881 by the Hebrew Benevolent Society, founded in 1867 with 25 charter members.

Prominent citizens buried here include Daniel Doppelmayer, first president of the Moses Montefiore Congregation; Rabbi Max Sylvius Handman; and members of the Kahn and Weisman families.

As we celebrate the tenth anniversary of our organization, this is a good time to reflect upon our progress and accomplishments as well as contemplate goals and priorities for the future. We have much of which to be proud. Since our founding meeting in San Antonio in 1980:

Films and Oral Histories

We have provided partial funding for:

- The widely-acclaimed film, "West of Hester Street," by producers Allen and Cynthia Mondell, about the Galveston movement.
- A documentary film, "This Is Our Home—It Is Not For Sale," by Jon Schwartz about the Jewish community of Riverside in Houston.
- An oral history project of Soviet Jewish emigres to Houston.
- An oral history of Rabbi David Jacobson of San Antonio and his wife, Helen Jacobson.

Essay Contest

For a number of years we have sponsored an essay contest for Jewish religious and day schools throughout the state.

Photographic History

Publication in 1990 of Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews, a photographic history.

Curriculum Guide

This fall, our *Curriculum Guide*, designed for 7th grade Jewish religious and day school students will be widely distributed.

The Handbook of Texas

We are in the process of doubling the number of entries to be included in this forthcoming revised edition of the state's encyclopedia. The TeJHaS has contributed funds to the Texas State Historical Association to complete the *Handbook*. Rabbi Jimmy Kessler serves as liaison with the TSHA.

Membership

We have more than tripled our membership in the last two years, with over 400 now paid up, under the

guidance of membership chair Fay Brachman. We are developing activities in a number of cities around the state, including Houston, Fort Worth, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, and Beaumont.

Newsletter

We have regularly published a newsletter for five years and plan to continue, expand and improve it.

Speakers Bureau

Various members of the Society

have spoken around the state and will continue to do so, particularly in conjunction with our new book, *Deep in the Heart*.

Oral Histories

Ginger Jacobs, the Oral History Chair, conducted a very successful Oral History Workshop for our members in Ft. Worth (with participants driving in from West Texas as well), at the home of Fay Brachman.

Archives and Acquisitions

Ima Joy Gandler, Archivist, advises that our Collection at the Barker Texas History Center (UT Austin), continues to grow. We had an exhibit of items from our Collection at the Barker Center during last March's Annual Meeting in Austin.

Expanded Board

Our Board has doubled in number, with representative leadership from around the state.

Priorities for the Future

The board is in the process of determining future priorities and goals. Proposals include a documentary/video film, the conducting of oral histories of all Texas retired rabbis and their wives, membership recruitment and retention in more cities, and documentation of all the state's Jewish cemeteries.

Books gain distribution through Wienir funding

A generous gift from Fannie Pravorne Wienir, formerly of Dallas, has made possible the placement of 40 copies of *Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews*, to libraries throughout the State of Texas.

The books are deeply appreciated. Brenda P. Tirrell of the Houston Public Library writes, "Thank you for your gift of ten copies of *Deep in the Heart*. It will be a welcome addition to the collections of our Texas Room, Social

Sciences Department and six branches that serve a sizable Jewish population." Mrs. Wienir was one of the state's first women to pass the bar. She attended the Jefferson School of Law at night and passed the fiveday Texas Bar Examination in 1928 with excellent grades. "I was a rarity in those days," she recalled. "The doors were opened to women. Finally, I found an office where they allowed me to hang my hat, provided I would answer the phone."

Mrs. Wienir moved to Philadelphia where she worked as a legal secretary. After her marriage to Harry Wienir, they owned a successful pharmaceuticals business in St. Louis. The couple retired to Los Angeles.

Mrs. Wienir's volunteer activities have included helping found the Dallas Business and Provessional Chapter of Hadassah in 1937 and more recently, serving as a Life Trustee of the American Society of the Technion of Israel.

Leader Ribak Definitely Jewish

Last issue we ran an article asking whether certain members of the Texas legislature were Jewish. Our readers assure us that Abraham Ribak (not Ribald) of San Antonio is Jewish, as is Edgar Berlin of Port Neches.

Marlin Barad, 13 Sedgwick Drive, Englewood, Colorado 80110 writes requesting information about his paternal grandfather, Louis Pulaski, who married Jewel Haag Juron in Dallas in 1936. Louis started Pulaski Iron and Metal in the 1930s and '40s and then an oil business, MPS Production, in the '40s and '50s in Houston.

He was a philanthropist who worked with his business partner, Morris Rauch, to enhance Jewish life in Houston and was a builder of Beth Yeshurun Congregation which has an auditorium named "Pulaski-Rauch." Barad's sister is Jane Pulaski Gravatt of Austin.

Mrs. Melvin D. (Betty) Cohen of San Antonio writes:

"Ben Dubinski was my father's (Dr. Alexander Brown's) brother-in-law, being married to my father's sister, Leah Brown Dubinsky.

"I was always under the impression that Ben Dubinski invented the Reliable Battery, which is still manufactured by the Du-

binsky family here in San Antonio. His grandson, Gerald Dubinski, is President of Standard Industries. Henry Hirshberg, a local lawyer, served as a Federal Bankruptcy Judge and retired at about 90. He was a good friend of Lyndon and Lady Bird Johnson. He helped them plan their wedding here in San Antonio and served as Lyndon's Best Man. One sister, Hannah Hirshberg, was active in Temple Beth-El and the Sisterhood; a small Chapel is named in her honor.

"Florence Ramer Rabe (one of Texas' first female attorneys), . . . being a dramatic person, went to California and got a part at the Pasadena Playhouse. A scout saw her and had her try out for the movies. She

became quite famous as Florence Bates and played character parts in many movies; the reruns are still shown on Cable TV. The first Jewish woman to be president of the American Association of University Women (in Texas) was Mrs. Israel (Fanny Weil) Alexander of Corpus Christi. . . . We also have a modern watercolor artist here in San Antonio who is well known Beth Weidenfeld Eidleberg Stern (Mrs. Leonard Stern). My husband, Col. Melvin D. Cohen, was one of the first men to drive an automobile from San Antonio to Mexico City before there was a Pan American Highway. He served in all three theaters of war during World War II: Hawaii, Europe, and the Pacific."
