MAKING HISTORY

"An Oral History Workshop" was hosted by Fay Brachman at her lovely home for Fort Worth Society members.

Ginger Jacobs, Dallas author and oral historian, conducted a "how to" session for an enthusiastic group on June 12.

Ruthe Winegarten gave a talk, "On the Trail of Texas Jewish History" at the Institute of Texian Cultures in San Antonio on May 27 to an overflow crowd of 100. Descendants of many pioneer San Antonio families were present, including Bette Cohen, daughter of Carrie Pfeiffer Brown.

Leon and Fay Brachman traveled to Abilene for a presentation about Texas Jewish history to members of Temple Mizpah, several of whom drove considerable distances to attend.

Temple Emanu El Religious School in Houston made a generation contribution to the TeJHaS. After careful study, the students chose the Society as one of the agencies they felt most needed their financial support.

The Texas Jewish Historical Society celebrated its 10th anniversary in Austin, March 2-4, with the announcement of an ambitious program, including the publication of a major work, *Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews* and a Curriculum Guide to be made available to every Jewish religious school in the state.

Other priorities include writing entries on Jews and Jewish Texans for the *Handbook of Texas*, the state's encyclopedia, oral history workshops around the state, and the documentation of Texas Jewish cemeteries.

Milton Smith of Austin was reelected president. Other elected officers included Rabbi Lawrence Jackofsky of Dallas, vice-president; Nell Hall of Fort Worth, secretary; Shelley Kessler of Galveston, treasurer; Fay Brachman of Fort Worth, membership chair; and Ima Joy Gandler of Waco, archivist.
