BBC TO PRODUCE FILM ON TEXAS JEWS

The BBC (British Broadcasting Corporation) is producing a major new

educational series of five new films on Jewish history and culture. The series, "The Jewish Enigma," is part of a course offered by the Open University, Britain's largest extension learning institution, in association with the London University-based Spiro Institute for Jewish History and Culture.

The film on the United States will focus on the Jews of Texas and Dallas. *Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews* is being used as the major reference for the film. Co-author Ruthe Winegarten was interviewed by series producer Graham Turner for the film. The series will air toward the end of 1991; negotiations for airing the series in the U.S. are under way with PBS.

"Max was a cousin of the Finklesteins of Luling. Mr. Finklestein was killed by a negro while traveling in a covered wagon. The widow was left with several small children. Her last child, William, was born after his father was killed. She (the widow) sold food to Jesse James.

Another child was Mrs. Josey, the mother of Mrs. M.M. Harris whose husband was the editor of the *San Antonio Express* for many years."

LOCAL DONATIONS

• Morris Riskind's Dry Goods Store was the major department store in Eagle Pass for many years. At its peak, the Jewish congregation consisted of 20 - 30 families in the area, owning a Torah, prayer and school books and a Ner Tamid. Morris Riskind's brother was the spiritual leader. As the congregation aged, the children moved away, older congregation disappeared. Morris Riskind has donated the memorabilia to Temple Beth Am in San Antonio.

Today's News is...

Political News: In the November 6th election, seven Jewish Texans won their races to represent their communities in the State House of Representatives: Reps Al Granoff (District 108) and Steven Wolens (District 103) both ran unoppsed for reelection in the Dallas area.

In Houston: veterans Paul Colbert (District 132) and Debra Danburg (District 137 - unopposed) were both reelected. Newcomer Sue Schecter (District 134) won her very tight race to replace the retiring Brad Wright.

In Austin, newcomers: Elliot Naishtat (District 49) defeated incumbent Bob Richardson and Sherri Greenberg (District 48) beat a Republican challenger in the race to replace the retiring Terral Smith.

Congressman Martin Frost (D, Dallas County) was also reelected.

First Texas Jewish Feminist Conference Held in Houston

The first Texas Jewish Feminist conference, sponsored by the Houston Chapter, American Jewish Committee's Women's issues Committee, met in Houston October 19 - 21. The conference, attended by over 125 women (and interested men), primarily from the Houston area, featured outstanding speakers from around the country including: Rabbi Lynn Gottlieb, spiritual leader and feminist storyteller; Henrietta Yurchenko, NYC, ethnomusicologist, whose specialty is Sephardic women's music; Dr. Irene Klepfisz, Yiddish scholar and lesbian/feminist poet; Dr. Susannah Heschel, professor of Judaic Studies at SMU; and Cantor Isabelle Ganz, a teacher at the Texas Institute of the Arts. Cathy Schecter and Ruthe Winegarten presented papers on the history and literature of Texas Jewish Women from their book *Deep in the Heart: The Lives and Legends of Texas Jews*.

ARCHIVES, DOCUMENTS AND SUCH...

Excerpt from "Memiors of Minnie (Raye Novit Siegel)" as told to her daughter Jan Seigel Hart (Temple), 1990.

Minnie grew up in Dublin, Texas, where her best friend was a little Irish girl, Mary Gallagher.

"On Jewish holidays, I told my class about my religion. On high holidays we closed the store...When I was little we had services in our home. My father had the Torah...All the relatives from Hamilton would come to our home, the Hareliks, Hoffmans, Ellis' and Comers. They spent two nights at Rosh Hashona...and again on Yom Kippur. We made pallets on the floor and we slept all over the place. It was a lot of fun. Morris (her brother)...would have a comic book stuck on top of his prayer book...Mama would be busy for days, baking. Haskell (hero of the play The Immigrant and Minnie's uncle) would blow the shofar.

Lillie took violin lessons. We always left the house when she practiced, such a screeching! ...One of my

best friend was Mildred Barrett, the Baptist preacher's daughter...I enjoyed attending the revivals with Mildred. When the preacher called everyone to come down and shake hands with him, that meant you wanted to be saved...I just went right along with Mildred and shook hands with the preacher.

One time after a revival, Preacher Barrett came to the store. He and Papa were good friends...Barrett told Papa about me coming down and shaking hands with him. "Brother Novit,...why don't you just let (your children) come to my church?"

Dad told him, "Brother Barrett, you say I have fine children. Why don't you go out and find some children that really need help? Get them to join your church. Don't bother my children."

My parents always told us that we had to be a little better than everybody else, since we were the only Jews

in town, besides the Hoffman family. We had to be better and smarter, so they could't talk bad about us. We couldn't go out with gentile boys. We had to marry within our own faith. We knew that and we accepted it. We didn't argue about it.

One time Nathan (Seigel, the young man she was courting and would marry) brought his mother to Dublin. When he went to the rest room and took down his pants, a bee flew out. It had ridden all the way from Dallas with him...We had a six week engagement."

She bought her wedding dress from Sanger Bros. for \$39.95 and took a honeymoon cruise from Galveston to Miami in 1938 and the coule settled in Dublin. They took their children to Sunday School in Fort Worth. The Seigels moved to Dallas in the 1960's where they still live.

RED BOOK OF DALLAS 1895-96

Social Ethics Club 145 Browder Street

This club was organized and duly incorporated under the laws of the state, with a capital stock of \$1,050.

In the constitution and by-laws adopted, the objects of the club are stated to be to promote the social, musical and dramatic culture of its members. Any unmarried gentleman over the age of 21 may become a member. The initiation fee is \$25, for which each member shall receive one share of stock in the club at the value of \$15, limited to seventy shares.

One of the older nuns at Ursaline told "her girls" that when the Ursaline which I attended was built, it was so far out (Bryan and Live Oak at St. Joseph Street) they were out in the country. The Sangers - one of them - would come with a pack on his back to take care of their needs for linens."

Inquiry about Jews in Big Spring

Barbara Israel, 21130 E. Knox Rd., Tempe, Arizona, is inquiring if anyone has information about her family who lived in Big Spring or about the Jewish Temple there which metat the Settles Hotel. Family names were Bessie (Mrs. Julian) Eckhaus; Jaye and Rhea Fisher; William and Nettie Fisher (Jand W Fisher retail store) - the Sisterhood was named for Nettie Fisher; Joseph and Anna Fisher (Nettie and

Anna were sisters). These members came to Big Spring in 1884. Rabbi David Lefkowitz is said by Mrs. Israel to have served the community.

Information requested about Ben Wilbush of Houston.

Mrs. Judy Rothman, 10775 Wilkins Ave., Los Angeles, California, 90024, is trying to trace the family of Ben Wilbush as well as receive more information about him. For several years we

have been told about a relative who settled in Texas (exact location unknown) sometime between 1850 - early 1900's, but surviving members of my father's family recall little information.

Our search has yielded this information from census data and old City directories:

- Ben Wilbush was listed in the 1900 census as the proprietor of Wilbush Drug Co. at 8113 1/2 Congress Avenue, Houston. Acutally, he is listed as the druggist.
- Ben Wilbush was again listed in the Houston City Directory (1902-1903) at the same address (minus the 1/2).
- Ben Wilbush was not listed in the 1903 Directory, but the Drug Store is with another individual named as proprietor.
- However, Wilbush, Emma, Miss, r.1808 Lyle and Wilbush, Laura A (wid. Ben), r. 1310 Hutchins 2 are both listed in the 1903 Directory and were also listed in the 1905-1906 Directory.

I would appreciate your assistance in helping me further establish the identity of Mr. Ben Wilbush and his possible relationship to my family. In addition, I would like to trace Mr. Wilbush's descendents, deceased, or more hopefully, living.
