1993 ANNUAL GATHERING TO BE HELD IN SAN ANTONIO MARCH 12-14

Our Annual Gathering is Friday March 12 through Sunday March 14 in San Antonio, one of the most historic cities in Texas. We will celebrate our special Bar Mitzvah Year as this is our thirteenth Annual Gathering.

A wonderful treat is planned for the Art Reception on Saturday evening. Ann Heiligman Saslav, pianist, and Dr. Isidor Saslav, violinist, will perform two Bloch violin and piano pieces. The Saslavs make their home in Overton, Texas. They are back from a shared musical residence of six years in New Zealand.

Our headquarters hotel for the Gathering is the *Holiday Inn at the San Antonio International Airport, 77 N. E. Loop 410, San Antonio, TX 78216.* You must make your own reservations with the hotel. Please *telephone* (512) 349-9900 and tell the reservationist that you have the TJHS convention rate of \$72 per night (plus tax) for a single/double room. The hotel provides free shuttle service to and from the airport. Be sure to telephone for the courtesy van when you arrive at the airport.

Pre-registration fee for the three-day meet-

ing for paid up members is \$25 or \$45 at the door. The fee for non-members is \$50 in advance or \$70 at the door. No meals are included in the registration fee. Friday night's fish dinner banquet is \$25, Saturday's luncheon buffet is \$15, and the Sunday continental breakfast is \$6. Friday's 2–4 PM bus tour of San Antonio is \$10 (space is limited, please reserve early). The Sunday 1:30–3:30 PM car tour of historic Castroville is \$5.

World Famous Musicians to perform at Gathering's Art Reception on Saturday Evening

Pianist Ann Saslav and violinist Dr. Isidor Saslav will perform at the TJHS 1993 Annual Gathering in San Antonio on Saturday evening, March 13, during the Art and Musical Reception which begins at 5:30 PM. It is a treat to hear their music.

Violinist Dr. Isidor Saslav, who may be best known as former concertmaster for the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, is now with the New Zealand Symphony. Dr. Saslav was appointed concertmaster of the New Zealand Symphony in 1986 after two decades as concertmaster of orchestras in Buffalo, Minneapolis, Baltimore, Washington, and Texas. In addition, he was on the faculty of the Eastman School of Music and a member of the Peabody Institute of Johns Hopkins University.

Pianist Ann Heiligman Saslav is a Fulbright scholar, music educator, and concertist with major orchestras throughout the country and abroad. Mrs. Saslav divides her time between New Zealand and the United States. Born in Texas, she made her debut with the Houston Symphony Orchestra at

the age of 15 and studied at the University of Indiana School of Music where she met and married Dr. Saslav.

They have performed as a duo throughout the United States, Canada, and Mexico, and have made tours in Europe. Last season the Saslavs received the Peggy and Yale Gordon Trust Medal for Excellence in Chamber Music Education in Baltimore for their programs "Adventures with 88 Keys" and "Adventures with the Violin and Piano".

DONALD TETER RECEIVES AWARD IN AUSTIN

The Texas Historical Foundation named Donald Teter of Baytown the recipient of its 1992 Deolece Parmelee Award for outstanding achievement in historical preservation research.

He was recognized for his work in locating and documenting over 70 Jewish cemeteries in Texas, and for

inspiring individuals and groups to help in the program of renovation and preservation. The award was presented to Donald at its Awards Dinner in Austin January 23, 1993.

Gertrude and Donald have spent many days since 1985 searching for forgotten cemeteries. It has been a labor of love and devotion as well as research for the TJHS archives. We can all take pride in this award.

The Texas Historical Foundation is an independent, non-profit, historical preservation organization which supports education, research, archaeology and preservation projects.

ACQUISITION FOR OUR ARCHIVES

Houston's JEWISH HERALD-VOICE Microfilm Provided by DR. and MRS. HOWARD LACKMAN

A generous contribution from Annette and Howard Lackman of Arlington has enabled TJHS to purchase from the New York Public Library microfilm copies of *The Houston Jewish Herald-Voice* dating from 1932 to 1989. The remaining issues of the paper from 1908 to 1932 are going to be microfilmed in the very near future by the Texas Newspaper Project at the University of Texas Austin. TJHS is participating in the cost of this project which will insure the permanence of this very important historical source.

To continue this project, the second

longest running newspaper that should be microfilmed is *The Texas Jewish Post* of Fort Worth Dallas. Microfilm of issues of the newspaper dating from 1963 to 1987 may be purchased from the American Jewish Historical Center in Cincinnati. The issues from 1947 1963 and 1987 1993 will be scheduled for microfilming by the Barker Library in the future with TJHS participating in the cost of the project.

We recently purchased from the American Jewish Periodical Center one reel of microfilm of *The Jewish* American (1938 1941), and 2 reels of *The Jewish Monitor* of Dallas (1919 1920 and 1928 1929).

We need information about missing issues of these newspapers and other Jewish newspapers in Texas so that we can have them scheduled for future microfilming.

TJHS newspaper microfilm reels are catalogued at the Barker Library in Austin. Members may arrange to read them there or have them sent to another library that participates in the Interlibrary Exchange program.

My Memories of the Waco Jewish Community's Relationship with Baylor University

During the depths of the depression of the 1930's Baylor University almost went bankrupt as it had almost no money to pay its staff. Baylor issued its own money called "Baylor Script" No one wanted to accept it. Even the ministers of the Baptist Church complained when it was left in the collection plates. Jewish merchants were the first in town to accept the script. Other Waco merchants followed. If the script had not been accepted Baylor might have gone bankrupt.

At one time there were two universities in Waco: Texas Christian University on the north side and Baylor on the south. T.C.U. moved to Ft. Worth after a fire. In the late 1920's there was a movement to move Baylor to Dallas. The City of Waco agreed to donate money to build an auditorium and Baylor remained in Waco. A fund raiser was started to raise money for Waco Hall. The Jewish community responded with contributions in greater proportions than other religious groups.

Pat Neff, President of Baylor, decided to

buy land adjacent to the campus for future expansion. Many people did not want to sell their land to Baylor. Frank Chaznow told me that whenever he bought land near Baylor, he would go to the campus to talk to Pat Neff and resell the land to Baylor. In this manner the university expanded.

When I was at Baylor there was a Jewish football player named Morris Weis, number 72. He was a tackle from Marshall, Texas, where his father had a tailor shop. When his parents sent kosher salamis, he and I would share them. He graduated with a B.B.A. in 1951.

Issie Fred designed the original Baylor University class ring which was gold with green stones as the Baylor colors are green and gold. On one side of the stones was the Tower of Old Main and on the other side the Baylor Bear. Issie Fred donated class rings to the football players each year and did many other things for the school.

American Jewish Historical Society National Conerence

New York Meeting/Tours

All TJHS members have a unique opportunity to attend the American Jewish Historical Society National Conference in New York City at the Mayflower Hotel April 29 through May 2, 1993. It is not necessary to be a member of AJHS to attend the meeting/tours, but you must pay the per person registration fee.

Tours will include guided visits to Ellis Island, the Lower East Side's Tenement Museum, and a walking tour of Colonial Jewish New York. Programs and lectures will be held at the Jewish Theological Seminary Library (the nation's greatest Judaica collection), Congregation Shearith Israel (New York's oldest congregation) with an authentic Sephardic lunch, and Central Synagogue (the oldest synagogue in continuous use in the U.S.). A dinner tour to Brighton Beach in Brooklyn requires an additional fee of \$40.
