**Program Presenters**

**Anita Bonanno**, born in Dallas, Texas, to Holocaust survivors Irma and Izy Freudenreich, shares a powerful story of love, survival, and resilience. Her parents met in the Łódź Ghetto and, despite being separated during deportation to Auschwitz-Birkenau, were reunited and married just days after liberation from Bergen-Belsen—an inspiring story that shaped Anita’s life. Blind since birth and living with cerebral palsy, Anita has built a remarkable life defined by determination and artistry. A talented vocalist from a young age, she earned a music degree from the University of North Texas and enjoyed a 21-year career with Texas Medical Center. She has served as High Holiday cantorial soloist and performed at numerous civic and community events in Houston. Honored with Temple Beth Torah’s Ner Tamid Award in 2024, Anita continues to inspire audiences with her voice and her story, celebrating the enduring power of faith, love, and the human spirit.

**Dr. Caryn Tamber-Rosenau** is assistant professor of Jewish Studies and Religious Studies at the University of Houston and directs the UH Jewish Studies program. She is a biblical scholar who specializes in studying women, gender, and sexuality in the Hebrew Bible and other early Jewish literature.

**Miranda Ruzinsky** is a Public History M.A. candidate at the University of Houston and a Lydia Mendoza Fellow. Her current research focuses on Holocaust remembrance and the power of narrative to inspire social justice. Miranda worked on the Sephardic Latinx Oral History Project, volunteers for the USC Shoah Foundation’s antisemitism collection, and is a published writer for Houston History Magazine.

**Marilyn Flick** shares a personal story connecting her family to Galveston’s Jewish history. Her husband’s family once owned a home in Galveston that later became the residence for congregation B’nai Israel’s rabbi; years afterward, Marilyn and her husband purchased the house themselves. The home holds special significance, as it was there that Rabbi Jimmy Kessler proposed to his wife, Shelley. Marilyn and TJHS Board Member and Past President Susan Zack Lewis are lifelong friends who grew up together in Big Spring, Texas. Marilyn currently lives in Houston and makes frequent visits to the family home in Galveston.

**Shelley Kessler** is a descendant of Jewish immigrants who came to America as part of the Galveston Movement in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. She is one of the few remaining descendants of Jewish immigrants from that time period still living on Galveston Island. Shelley is actively involved in preserving and nurturing the story of the Galveston Movement. She is a member of the Galveston County Museum’s podcast team where she shares her family’s immigration story and the Galveston Movement. Shelly’s late husband Jimmy (*may his memory be a blessed memory*), who died in 2022, was another key figure in Galveston’s Jewish history. Jimmy Kessler served as B’nai Israel’s rabbi for 32 years until his retirement in 2014. He also was the founder and first president of the Texas Jewish Historical Society.

**Melissa Cohen-Nickels** is Curator of the Joan and Stanford Alexander South Texas Jewish Archives at Rice University. As an educator and historian, she has taught history at The Emery/Weiner School and in Fort Bend ISD. Currently, Cohen-Nickels is teaching at the religious school for Congregation Beth El in Missouri City. She also has worked closely with the Houston World Affairs Council as a member of its Core Teacher Council, creating programming and curriculum.

**Melanie Weinberger** is a Middle School English Teacher at The Emery/Weiner School (EWS). Melanie grew up in Houston and attended EWS from sixth to twelfth grade. Melanie attended the University of Texas at Austin and earned a degree in Applied Learning and Development. She taught in Austin for eight years, and developed a passion for teaching students to become readers and writers. She moved back to Houston and joined EWS in 2025. Melanie enjoys walks with her dog, Reese, listening to music, crafting, and spending time with friends and family.

**Barbara Rosenthal** is an award-winning filmmaker with nearly four decades of experience creating documentaries that educate, inspire, and deepen public understanding of history and culture. Her most recent film, *Grit & Grace: How Jewish Women Built a Better Texas*, explores 19th- and 20th-century Texas history through the lives of five influential Jewish women and their lasting community impact. Three years in the making, the film reflects Rosenthal’s lifelong passion for women’s history and storytelling. Her previous work includes *Seders & Cigars – A History of Jews in Tampa* (2019), now archived in the Library of Congress.

**Ziggy Gruber** is a Houston-based restaurateur and cultural preservationist best known as the owner of Kenny & Ziggy’s New York Delicatessen, which he opened in 1999. He is the third generation to run a Jewish Deli; his grandfather Max Gruber left Budapest, Hungary, worked in New York delis, and in 1927 opened The Rialto Deli on Broadway; his father Gene (Eugene) Gruber then continued in the business. Gruber trained from an early age in his family’s Jewish deli tradition and later studied at Le Cordon Bleu in London before working in Michelin-star restaurants. In 2016, he co-founded National Deli Month to celebrate and preserve Jewish deli culture while raising funds for local nonprofits. Through this initiative, Kenny & Ziggy’s supports the Holocaust Museum Houston, hosts annual luncheons for Holocaust survivors, and lends deli memorabilia to museum exhibitions. His work bridges food, memory, and Jewish heritage, making a lasting impact on Houston’s cultural landscape.
